Our guided nature walks got off to a flying start with Keith Palmer's tour of lichens on 21st April. Magnifying glasses were a must for some of the thirty species of tiny beautiful lichens growing on tombstones, walls and trees in the cemetery. A "lichen walk" booklet is in hand so you can make your own inspection.

More aspects of the cemetery's flora and fauna will be looked at during the walks arranged for the summer. Note we have a new date to add. On 19th October, Dr Ian Beavis will give us an overview in a talk "Natural history of Woodbury Park Cemetery".

An environmental management plan is being built up from all the surveys being carried out. If you would like to help with this, contact Brian Kempster (01892 618347).

Our current long-term notion is to foster and develop the "arboretum" features of the cemetery. Let us know what you think about that and any choice item that might be planted. Your editor fancies a "tree of heaven" (alas too invasive) surrounded by some archangel plants.

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Exhibition material

An impressive collection of early documents about the cemetery displayed at the AGM included Queen Victoria's Order in Council from Balmoral requiring the burial vaults to be tightly sealed. Another interesting new item was Brian Kempster's pictures of flower carvings on the

tombstones, often conveying a message from the Victorian "language of flowers" – lily of the valley, acanthus, roses, ferns, ivy. The sickle below the roses on this carving signifies a woman cut off in the prime of life.



More contributions of interesting display material as well as relevant documents and pictures for our archives would be most welcome.

Historical work

History enthusiasts are seeking to find out more about the people recorded on the 644 memorials and information is trickling in. However an even bigger task lies ahead. The burials list shows that there are in fact over 6,200 people buried in the graveyard, most of their resting places anonymous under the grass and trees. If you would like to help find out who they were, contact Michael Clegg (01892 525753) who will suggest what to look out for and where it might be. You don't need expertise – just enthusiasm and patience. The expertise follows!
